We have also started a Book Club this year for Senior School students and so far we have discussed The Hunger Games by Suzanne Collins, Animal Farm by George Orwell and Of Mice and Men by John Steinbeck.

Our Junior School is all set up with outdoor cushions and rugs so that they can read outside when the warmer weather arrives. The Junior classes sometimes join together so that the older students can read with the younger children. J6/7 have written and designed some eye-catching shelf-talkers for their class library.

We raised over £200 during a Hot Chocolate Friday in November. The money was used to buy books at The Ginger Cat Bookshop which we then wrapped and donated to Inverclyde Women's Aid to distribute to children who don't get many presents at Christmas.




English

Our S4 - 6 students are busy getting ready for exam season in April & May. \$5/6 have enjoyed studying the American classic The Great Gatsby, as well as the poetry of Norman MacCaig.

also An Inspector Calls by J.B. Priestley, a timeless play about the importance of social responsibility. In other year groups, we have been getting to grips with Shakespeare's Julius Caesar and The Merchant of Venice, WW1 poetry, as well as some more contemporary novels and plays.

All our texts allow the students to explore many thought-provoking and powerful themes, while developing their reading, writing and talking skills.



Mathematics

\$4 and \$5 pupils have now completed their courses to allow plenty of time for revision.

The best way to revise for Maths exams is to do all the available past papers. In class we will go over exam technique and address any topics that may still be causing problems. \$1-3 pupils continue to work hard.

We have been especially focussing on the algebra skills required for success in later years. MathsPad resources for \$1 and \$2 have been a great help. We also use the iPad as a mini whiteboard to check for pupils' understanding during teaching.



Social Subjects

We have been off to a flying start in social subjects after half term.

Our senior pupils have been hard at work with their SQA coursework with some of them investigating some interesting topics.

I'm sure you will agree that they have been working very hard and wish them every success in preparing for their upcoming exams!



\$1 and \$2 have also been busy learning about the USA and North Korea.

Over the coming weeks, we will embark on some debatable topics such as arming teachers in the USA and playing some Jenga to see how long we can survive in a dictatorship!



Business Studies

This has been a very hard working and exciting term in Business Studies.

The S4 - 6 students have been investigating a business of their choice, using a concept from our course content. These have been incredibly interesting and varied.

One title from these assignments is 'Assessing the effectiveness of the Corporate Social Responsibility of Dove'.

These assignments will form part of their final mark towards their award.

S3 students have been busy learning about the Management of People, and what a recruitment process looks like - do we have some potential HR managers of the future?




French

Partnership with Smiths to support Aid for Education in Rwanda

Cedars School and Smiths of Greenock have partnered to donate old PE uniforms.

<u>Aid for Education</u> - a charity based in Rwamagana, Rwanda, is transforming the future of hundreds of children and their families by providing education, basic medical care and shelter, as well as sponsoring pupils to attend schools in the local area,

Aid for Education now runs its own nursery and primary school: Tubarere. On a school trip to Rwanda in 2016, pupils from Cedars helped to build a classroom and taught some lessons. Aid for Education is run by Douglas and Sarah Kakooza, who are based in Greenock.

When we developed our new PE kit last year, we wanted to use our old stock to support the school in Rwanda.

We approached Smiths, who have supplied Cedars uniform since 1999, and owner Keith Wilson was delighted to partner with us to support this venture.

Douglas will go out to Rwanda later this year, and pupils from Cedars will supply spare suitcases and help to pack the polo shirts and jumpers ready to go to pupils in the school in Rwanda.

Last week, Keith met Douglas Kakooza and some pupils from Cedars School, to hand over the stock and wish Douglas well in his travels to Rwanda this year.
